I'm pleased to report that the festival organizers and volunteers are on schedule. Everything is coming together. Incredible! It's hectic, however, so perhaps you shouldn't bet on perfection. Bet on a very rich day.

Information and Instructions

Please find a rough-draft copy of the festival schedule enclosed. The final schedule will appear in the **September 22** issue of *See* Magazine.

Please locate your readings on the schedule. Your group will read twice (i.e. once at two different venues.) Please be at each reading a little bit early. Someone in your group will have been asked to host the readings (or run the show) for your group. Your host will give you your complimentary anthology and your \$10 honorarium. He or she should contact everyone in your group ahead of time, to see what plans your group might want to make.

Your reading time at each venue should be close to five minutes. It might be advisable to time the poems you plan to read. If you like to introduce your poems, you should take that into account. The idea of the festival is for a considerable number of poets to showcase their work to an audience; hence we must pay careful attention to sharing the stage. The performance time for a group at a venue should be half an hour, which leaves half an hour for everybody to visit, have a coffee or browse, and stroll to another show. Hosts should be very brief in their introductions.

If you wish to sell your work at any of the bookstores, you should talk to the store managers before the festival. There's no conflict in selling your work at any of the other venues.

Brunch with Don McKay


