The Twelve Days of Poetry 1998-1999: A Work in Progress

THE STROLL OF POETS 8TH Annual 12th Day of Poetry moves back to a familiar location: The Strathcona Legion, 10416 – 81st Avenue, on January 16, 1999, 8PM.

"This year's 12th Day, like every other, will have its own distinctive atmosphere," promises 12 Days Coordinator David Huggett. Among the twists this year look for displays of visual art by participants in Art From the Unknown by local artists living in poverty.

"Art From the Unkown is a step out of the mainstream of the art world," Huggett says. "The intention is to liven up the venue and provide opportunities for communication between some remarkably creative people."

At the heart of the 12th Day, as always, are the 4 poets chosen by the audiences at the preceding 11 readings. The series opens at the Breadstick Café (December 28, 29, 30), moves to Grounds for Coffee (January 2, 4, 5), then to La Boheme (January 6, 7), and the Upper Crust (January 11, 12, 13). All readings start at 7PM.

"The 12th Day celebrates poetry but it is also a good time to catch up with friends, brainstorm, and let our hair down on the dance floor," Huggett says. Featured musician, Dale La Douceur, will treat the audience to her unusual but versatile instrument, the Chapman Stick. She and her friends will warm us up with jazz and blues, and get us on our feet when we are ready to dance.

La Douceur toured Europe with Bruce Cockburn and performed on mainstage at the Edmonton Folk Fest in 1991. She is known locally for her collaboration with The Mavens and Painting Daisies.

Guest speaker and M.C. for the evening, Srdja Pavlovic, is a translator and contributing editor to the international literary journal, *Stone Soup*. Published in London, UK, *Stone Soup* has become a champion of Alberta writers. Pavlovic will contrasts the popular perception of Alberta writing with the realities facing most writers. He is presently completing an anthology of contemporary writing in Alberta to be published by The University of Alberta Press.

Since 1991 the Stroll has helped dozens of Edmonton poets to gain recognition. For some of them, the 12th Day has been a significant step toward publication and awards. This year promises its own discoveries.

Save the Tuesday Night Reading Series?

THE IDEA OF A Tuesday Night Reading Series for this winter has generated 40 poets who want to read, and ZERO poets who want to organize it. It is a lot of work to organize a reading series, but not so much as you might think, given all the people who have volunteered to help - as hosts, with PR, and so on. Truth is, somebody needs to step forward to pull it all together, to make some decisions and coordinate the volunteers, or there won't be a reading series this year.

I'll speak personally. I think providing a place to read is the most important thing the Stroll does. When I found the stroll, it was a Godsend. There were poems I wanted to get out of me, and here was a place to speak them. I got an audience, support and feed back. I've become a better poet in the 5 years I participated in the series. I organized the series a couple years ago. It was work and there were issues to deal with, but it was no worse than an average day at the office. Anybody who has ever been able to hold down a job probably has all the skills necessary to coordinate the reading series (or do most any job in the Stroll) - particularly with all the help available and experienced people to draw on.

Those of us who have some skills need to keep Stroll events happening! (as a volunteer for some little task, or as a coordinator for a bigger one) That's what I think.
