President's Message

Fellow Strollers,

November already. Post-Stroll, in other words. And the Anthology is coming together, but still a long way off till December 18, when the Anthology will be launched. Hmmm. What to do? Ah, the Poetry for Windy Nights at the Idlewylde on October 21st was a hoot. With a good-sized audience and complimentary coffee and cookies, we couldn't have asked for more. The essence of the Stroll was brought home again in the singular and distinctive points of view by the five poets who read together.

But now, what's a Stroller to do? November, and the cold winds are coming. Orlando Books, thank the muse, continues to host some of the best readings in town. The U of A Press issued an open invitation to join them in launching 5 titles at the Timms Centre for the Arts on October 28. Alice Major launches her new book, *Tales for an Urban Sky*, on November 18 at Volume II. So, there *bave* been events to keep us out of the cold.

As I sorted through the Anthology submissions on the chilly evening of October 2, I was so eager to read each poem, each bio, but knew I had to get the manuscript ready for photocopying so the jurors could get to work. Choosing the 44 poems from about 125 poems is no easy task. Each voice, each idea, each word in the Anthology comes at the reader from different compass points, different interior geographies and sensibilities. What makes one poem work for a juror, and another poem not work? Personal connections to the poem, in many cases. Simple druthers in other cases. Remembering that the jurors are looking at these poems without knowing who wrote them makes their choices, in the end, so much more exciting, and so much more the better.

When I finally get a chance to read the poems and put them together with the bios into the Anthology, I can't wait to find out who wrote each poem. Not being a juror, I unabashedly flip the poem over to read the poet's name on the back. That's part of being with the Stroll, I guess. Matching up personalities and physical beings with their poetry, and slowly, slowly developing a sense of who the poet is makes the job of editing the Anthology and the joy of being part of the Stroll such a pleasure.

You know, there is a lot of interest in the Stroll outside of our community too. Ask Vanna Tessier or Jenine Dumont, two of the tireless volunteers who sat at the Stroll booth at The Word Is Out Book Fair. A special thanks to you both for making the presence of the Stroll felt in the literary community! It's important for the information/membership forms/Anthologies to be available at events like the Book Fair. Jo-Ann Godfrey is to be thanked as well for showing up at this event as well as almost every single reading to sell the Anthologies.

Thank you all for participating in the 9th Annual Stroll of Poets Festival. A warm thanks to Dean McKenzie and Spiritus for hosting a marathon Poetry Sweatshop, and to Rusti Lehay for putting together a smooth-running, vibrant Stroll. Thanks to all the board members for giving their time, and putting themselves forward before, during, and after the Stroll.

Until the 18th of December, then, when you are all invited to the Anthology book launch and Stroll Christmas Party at City Hall 2-4 PM. Be of good cheer. Nancy Mackenzie

A NOTE FROM OUR ANTHOLOGY EDITOR

It is great to be published in the Anthology and I think most Strollers really look forward to having their poems published in the annual Anthology. Some of you will be a little surprised when you open up the Anthology to find that your poems are slightly different from the poems and bios you had submitted. Here's why your work has been changed:

People who submitted poems in handwritten format, or poems that were too long or too wide, may find their work seriously edited.

Some people neglected to submit a bio. While I tried to contact each person whose work had to be edited, not everyone returned my calls or was willing to help out. Some poets, it seems, just can't write shorter lines or shorter poems. So, if you find your poem has had new line breaks inserted, or has been shortened, please remember this: each poet is allowed one page for bio and poem. The specs of 58 spaces wide and 30 lines long for a poem, and 75 words per bio have to be adhered to, or the anthology won't work. NM
