A Message from the Prez...

It came to me in a nightmare: THE END OF POETRY. One gnarled toothless poet was left standing. Sort of. Actually, he or she was propped against a wall. My heart pumping urgently in my throat, I awoke and realized something: I was the new President of the Stroll of Poets Society. Ah! So this was just a run-of-the-mill anxiety dream.

Actually, the Stroll's *neal* nightmare, I believe, is that of becoming a shrinking and ultimately finite group. The passion I have — as Prez, as coordinator of Poetry Tuesdays 2000, as my alter ego The Alberta Beatrik, as host of the Grounds For Jammin' open stage at Grounds for Coffee — is fuelled simultaneously by fear and vision.

Here's the "vision" part: to make the year 2000 (the 10^{th} anniversary of Stroll) a year for spreading The Word, for reaching out to experienced and younger, energetic novice poets alike and saying, "Hey, join the Stroll!"

The 10th Anniversary of the Stroll will indeed be one to remember... as memorable, indeed, as the inspiration-oozing Poetry Tuesday reading series (especially Dean McKenzie's Night of Jazz Poetry). We have a great Board with nifty new ideas, energy and individual expertise. As well, the work of last year's visionaries will be paying off this year during Stroll 2000 Festival of Poetry (October 1st thru 7th). Watch for this in the media, because it really IS worth hyping. The hope is to put on readings by "big ticket poets" like Jeffrey McDaniel, Derek Walcott and Lorna Crozier... and to put on "interactive" events like

a Poetry Slam, a Multi-Media Poetry Contest, even (gasp!) Triple-X Poetry.

Yes, the standard Sunday Stroll will still be in effect on October 1st of this year. Jocko, Jonathan Meakin and Gordon McRae (from the Stroll 2000 committee) are just "jazzed" about doing something BIGGER, too. (And they'll need volunteers to make it all happen.)

Q: What else do I have to say? \mathcal{A} : Too much. I will be as brief as bullets:

- The new Board is great. For a complete listing of titles, check out the Stroll web site.
- · We're looking for more "media exposure" this year (Thomas Trofimuk, Volunteer Coordinator, is experienced at media relations and I, too, have some background in this area). Indeed, did anyone see the A Channel segment on A Night of Jazz Poetry?
- · We're also keen on building more relationships with other arts organizations, possibly in the area of live performance, cross promotions, etc.
- The Stroll logo is in the process of being changed even though some people still dig the old one; have patience, however, because we're sure the new logo will be a jaw-dropper.

Here's my final statement: I state here and now that we are all, together, going to make 2000 the Year The Word Exploded.

Anthology Cover Art:

Submit graphic art for consideration for the cover of the 2000 Anthology. Color photos or photocopies of artwork is acceptable for review. Please submit your graphic art for this year's Anthology cover by May 31, 1999. <u>Honorarium</u> will be confirmed pending grant application acceptance.

12 Days Coordinator:

Responsibilities: locate venues, make up poet roster, work with volunteers, take care of details apropos to organizing the event (tickets, posters, hosts, etc.). Honorarium will be confirmed pending grant application acceptance.


Reading Series Coordinator:

Responsibilities: Locate venues—make up poet roster—choose themes for poetry evenings—liaise with publicity committee and volunteer coordinator—ensure each evening is set up with a host and the sound system.

Stroll 2000 Coordinators:

The Stroll 2000 committee is looking for both coordinators and volunteers to help with what will be the biggest Stroll ever. The seven-day series of events (October 1-7) will include readings from out-of-town poets, readings from the history of poetry, and numerous other poetry events such as a poetry slam, an evening full of very, very bad poetry, an evening of edgy poetry (from the erotic to the rude), and the list goes on.


