In closing, I'd like to emphasize how important it is that we publicize this event by word of mouth. It is something that every member can do, and it is an effective way of drawing an audience to our festival. So let's make the Stroll the talk of the town.

ANTHOLOGY GUIDELINES



POETS READ THESE GUIDELINES *very carefully*. POEMS AND /OR BIOS THAT IGNORE THE SPECIFICATIONS FOR THE *ANTHOLOGY* MAY BE CUT, NARROWED, SHORTENED OR HAVE BROKEN LINES.

THIS MAY UNINTENTIONALLY CHANGE THE MEANING OF YOUR POEM OR BIO.

- 1) POEMS MUST HAVE TITLES.
- 2) MAXIMUM LENGTH OF POEM: ...30 LINES ...(THIS INCLUDES A ONE LINE TITLE AND BLANK LINES BETWEEN STANZAS.
- 3) MAXIMUM WIDTH OF POEM: ... 58 SPACES.
- 4) FONT TO BE USED IS 12 PT TIMES NEW ROMAN

<u>SUBMISSION FORMATTING</u> :

- 1) POEMS & BIOS MUST BE TYPED EACH ON THEIR OWN 8.5 x 11 WHITE PAPER IN 12pt TIMES NEW ROMAN.
- 2) PRINT & SIGN YOUR NAME ON THE BACK OF THE POEM.
- 3) IMPORTANT: PRINT...." YES" or "NO" or "I (do or do not) wish to be included in the 12 days contest.
- 4) DO NOT STAPLE YOUR POEM AND BIO TOGETHER. YOUR COPIES MUST BE FREE OF STAINS. (as photocopies will be made for the 12 days jurors)
- 5) GIVE YOUR POEM AND BIO TO THE HOST OF YOUR PERFORMANCE GROUP AT THE STROLL.


VOLUNTEER OF THE MONTH: KATHRYN R CHARR

- ♦ WHEN HEADING TO YOUR VENUE *PLEASE BE PROMPT!* TRY TO BE AT THE VENUE 15 MINUTES EARLY SO YOU CAN MAKE CONTACT WITH YOUR HOST.
- ◆ YOU *MUST* HAVE YOUR ANTHOLOGY SUBMISSION READYFOR YOUR HOST AT THIS TIME. (anthology guidelines on page 2)
- PLEASE NOTE THAT POETS SIGNING UP FOR THE OPEN STAGE OR NEW STROLL MEMBERS NOT ON THE SCHEDULE TO READ WILL NOT BE ABLE TO SUBMIT TO THE ANTHOLOGY PUBLICATION.
- ◆ HAVE A FABULOUS READING AND REMEMBER TO HAVE A TRIAL RUN THOUOUGH OF YOUR READING PRIOR TO STROLL DAY. KEEP YOUR READING TO 5 MINUTES SO THAT YOU ARE NOT RUNNING INTO ANOTHER POETS "STAGETIME".
